CEA Foundation Mini Grants Impact Student Achievement

Only CEA Members are eligible to receive CEA Foundation Mini Grants. The mini grant projects must be aligned to the CEA Foundation Mini Grant Mission Statement, to empower CEA members, in good standing, to design and implement innovative opportunities that will ultimately lead to higher achievement for all students. Through the creative and inspiring lens of teaching and learning, CEA Members have had great success with using their funds to create hands-on learning opportunities for students to reach their highest levels of achievement. Here are two examples of how CEA Members used their Mini Grant funds to support the goals of their students.

CEA Member, Andrea Cywinski (OT/PT at Como ES

and AIMS) created Assistive Technology for Occupational Therapy Fine Motor Tasks for her students. She reported, "This grant was used to purchase assistive technology for students who are non-verbal or have communication needs to use during occupational therapy sessions. The switches purchased allow students to select pre-recorded messages to make choices during occupational therapy sessions.



For example, switches can be programmed for concepts such as colors, shapes and letters, or for simple phrases like "help" or "all done." The fine motor materials purchased allow for students to complete STEM activities such as sorting by color/number, counting, or identifying shapes and letters. Additionally, working on fine motor skills allows students to be more independent for classroom tasks."

Paul Laskert (Beechcroft HS) used his CEA Mini Grant to grow the Columbus City Schools Exceptional Science Fair, a science fair for all of the MD and OI special education units throughout CCS. "This year we had 100 students and numerous science-focused projects on display, as well as multiple guests including ODNR, Metro Parks, and the 'Bug



Man.' The Columbus City Schools Exceptional Science Fair is the only science fair of its kind in Ohio. This year's Mini Grant helped purchase Tesla Coils, showing the amazing aspects of airborne electrical circuits, and store bought hardware magnets that attempted to replicate perpetual motion. The CEA Mini Grant also helped with the fair's logistics, taking care of and assisting the 200+ individuals who attended. The academic focus and fun, interactive two hours that happen at Beechcroft every second Friday in November are assisted and made possible by the CEA Mini Grant."

Start planning now for the SY 2024–2025 Mini Grant! The application window opens in early October and members are permitted one Mini Grant per year. Look for details in the *Voice* and on the CEA website. Mini Grants are awarded in the following areas: Early Career Educator, SEL/PBIS, General Projects, and STEM/STEAM.

Appealing Your Evaluation

The Joint Evaluation Panel has approved an appeals process for staff who wish to appeal their evaluation. Staff must meet one of the following criteria:

- Educators that have an overall Final Holistic Rating of "Ineffective"
- Two evaluators and the overall rating is questionable
- The evaluation contains a procedural error

The Evaluation Appeal Form is available on the ILEAD Evaluation: Evaluation Resources & Process on the CCS staff website. Scroll down to "District Forms" to access the document. Members who meet the criteria to file an appeal should submit the completed appeal form along with appropriate documentation to Teri Mullins at CEA by 4:30 p.m. on Friday, May 24, 2024. The Joint Evaluation Panel will meet to review appeal requests the week of June 3. CEA Salary Schedule Degree Progression Survey: To help CEA prepare for the next round of bargaining, members will receive a survey regarding their progression towards different degrees on the salary schedule. This survey is not the comprehensive bargaining survey sent out in the late fall of a bargaining year. This short survey seeks to understand how many hours members have in between the different columns (BA, BA+, MA, etc.), if they have multiple degrees, members' intent to progress from one column to the next, and so on. An email was sent to members' non-CCS email addresses May 10 that contained the link to the survey. It will close Tuesday, May, 28, at 11:59 p.m. If you did not receive the link or if CEA does not have your current non-CCS email address, send it to tellcea@ceaohio.org. You can access the survey from home or work.

Make a Donation to the Catastrophic Sick Leave Bank: When someone experiences a life-threatening illness or injury, and they are out of accrued time, they can apply for catastrophic leave. When approved, sick leave days can be donated, allowing them to remain in paid status and receive healthcare benefits. Resignation and Insurance: In the past, when a member worked to the end of the year, then resigned, their insurance benefits were terminated within thirty days of the resignation. For example, a member who resigned effective May 31 would have their benefits terminated at the end of June. That practice caused our members to wait until the last day to resign (July 10) to keep their benefits through the end of July. As a result, the District had a hard time filling those late vacancies. CEA has negotiated with the District to allow members who are resigning (and finish out the school year) to resign with an effective date of July 1 or later at any point in the school year with their benefits maintained through July 31. As an example, a teacher could submit a resignation notice on Feb. 1 with an effective date of July 10 and the employee's benefits would be maintained pursuant to Article 109.03(I)(15) of the Master Agreement through July 31. If your license from ODE is expiring June 30, 2024, and you have a limited employment contract, you must complete the required coursework or CEUs for renewal and applied prior to Mar. 15 to be licensed by ODE for the 2024–2025 school year. In addition to the online application, you will need to complete a background check. Fingerprinting must be completed through Webcheck. A permanent certificate requires fingerprinting every five years. The Human Resources Department, (3700 S. High St.) oversees this process. The CCS Fingerprint Office is open Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-4 p.m. Face-to-face operations are on an appointment-only basis.
